2 A. Other York County Hoggs.

While Richard Hogg Sr. and Mary Austin Hogg, his wife were residing in Gloucester with their family of young children prior to 1750, there was living in York County one, Charles Hogg, who died in 1736. Nothing is known of this man's ancestry or his descendants, if indeed there were any descendants. That he was a man of much personal property is indicated by the record of the administration of his estate, in 1736 in York County Court. The inventory and appraisement are as follows: (1)

The above estate amounting to two hundred and eleven pounds, thirteen shillings and two pence was appraised by us, the subscribers, being first sworn.

James Wray; Laban Scott; Joseph Davenport, Pat Ferguson.

At a Court held for York County May 17, 1736 this inventory and appraisement of the estate of Charles Hogg, Dec'd. was presented in court and ordered to be recorded.

Teste - Matt. Hubard. Ch. of County.

Nothing further is known of this Charles Hogg, and this long inventory may seem unimportant, or not related to this manuscript; it is included to point out something of the elegance of his way of life, as a citizen of York County.

There was a Richard Hogg living in upper York County, possibly in or near Williamsburg which at that time was partly in York County, in 1762, according to the following items taken from the York Records:

"Indenture from Thomas Craig and Ann his wife to William Phillips for two lots in Williamsburgh, Va.; March 12, 1762. Witnesses: Daniel Prentiss; Richard Hogg, William Taylor; William Russell." (2)

"Indenture: Richard Graves, planter of County of York, and Dionysia his wife to Joseph Hornsby of City of Williamsburgh, 200 acres in Burton Parish, May 25, 1763. Witnessed by Richard Hogg and three other persons." (3)

1768 - Ordered that Thomas Hornsby pay unto Richard Hog, 241 pounds of tobacco and two shillings for one day's attendance coming and returning 72 miles and ferriages as a witness for him against James Hubard. "Ferriages" denotes across the river; compared with other orders for witnesses, no ferriage was specified. The same Orders mentioned "ferriage for Mordecai Cooke", thus indicating these witnesses came from Gloucester to York Count. (4)

All of the following items regarding Hogg have been found in the York County records. Proof is lacking of their relationship to the Hoggs traced in the main body of this manuscript, even though the repetition of given names, association in buying and selling land, in the settlement of estates, witnessing documents, etc. point to family kinship; therefore it becomes necessary to list these York County Hoggs separately.

Charles Hogg purchased land in York County April 6, 1806. There is nothing to show whether this Charles was a son of the earlier Charles Hogg who died in 1736. The abstracted deed follows. (5)

"A deed, April 6, 1806. Witnesseth: Beginning on the main road which leads down into Goodwins Neck at a marked gum on the line which divided the lands of Walter Burwell from the land of Corbin Griffin, lately the land of William Stevenson, thence along a ditch - - - to Burt's land, thence along Burt's line - - - right angles with a ditch which leads through the lands of the said Griffin - - - side of the old Crab Neck road, thence in a direct course - - - side of the said old road and now the main road which leads to Goodwin's Neck - - - down the main road, its several turns to the beginning - - - with all houses, etc, unto him the said Charles Hog and to his heirs forever; 50 acres.

Witnessed by Thomas Archer; Thos. Hansford, John Holderby, John Hog. Sold for 50 pounds.

A deed of trust was prepared on April 10, 1806 and recorded at the April 21 Court, between Charles Hogg and Corbin Griffin for the sum of 50 pounds, giving this 50 acres of land as security, to be paid by April 10, 1808. (6)

Charles Hogg's wife was Susanna, also called Sally, They had five or more children; however there was only one birth recorded in the Charles Parish Register. It stated: "Stephen Hogg son of Charles and Sally Hogg was born December 5, 1786."

Frances Hogg was their daughter. She was named in the settlement of Charles Hogg's estate as his daughter and the wife of Edmund Power. Her marriage is of record: "Edmund Power and Frances Hogg, marriage Bond January 15, 1810." (7)

It is probable but not proven that Randal Hogg who died in 1811, John Hogg the Younger who died in 1818, and James Hogg who died in 1820 were sons of Charles and Susanna Hogg.

Charles Hogg died in 1809. His estate was settled by the Sheriff, Robert Sheild, and the account of sales is dated September 29, 1809.

November 18, 1811 Received of Robert Sheild Sheriff of York County, Admin. of Charles Hogg dec'd the sum of fl4-4-6 $\frac{1}{2}$  in full for the balance due in his hands to the estate of said Charles Hogg after deducting the portion due to Edmd. Power in right of his wife. (signed) Susa X Hogg.

Witness J. Sheild Jr.

Returned into York Court 18 day of November 1811. - - - - - be paid by the sheriff to Susanna Hogg for the support of the infant children of said Charles Hogg, dec'd - (teste) Sam'l Sheild cle.

The next small estate to be settled was that of Randal Hogg. Agreeable to an order of York Court dated October 19, 1812, commissioners were appointed to appraise his personal property. (9)

At a Court held for York County 21st February 1814 the foregoing inventory and appraisement of the estate of Randal Hogg dec'd was - - returned by Moreland and Burt, two of the appraisers appointed - - - deposed that William Powell assisted them to appraise the estate but that, previous to signing the above he departed this life, whereupon it is ordered recorded.

John Hogg Senior and Lewis Hogg Senior were appointed by the court to be the administrators of Randal Hogg's affairs. They made their report of 33 pounds, 18 shillings and  $\frac{1}{2}$  penny due the estate on May 18, 1814. Signed by Edw'd Wright, Kemp Charles Sr. Lewis S. Charles.

It was recorded June 20, 1814.

Susanna Hogg, widow of Charles Hogg died between June 15, 1812 and March 9, 1813. On the first date, by order of Court, two-thirds of the 50 acres of land which Charles Hogg bought in 1809 was sold to John Hogg Senior, (10) with the reversion of the other third at the death of Charles Hogg's widow. On March 9, 1813 the commissioners, appointed by the court to appraise the estate of Susanna Hogg, dec'd made their report: (11)

There was found among the York County Loose papers, stored at Virginia State Library, Richmond the Court order dated "January 19, 1818 Lewis Hogg appointed administrator of the estate of one, John Hogg the Younger."

The Court appointed John Fox, John Hogg Senr. and Edward Wright commissioners to appraise the personal property and the account of the sale was reported May 28, 1818.

A few items mentioned in the settlement were: (13)

Returned into York County Court February 21, 1820 and recorded."

Of the 28 York County Marriage Bonds for Hogg's, all have been identified except the following:

"Rebecca Hogg, spinster, and Samuel Morris, York-Hampton Parish July 17, 1811. John Hogg, security."

The following court records relate to one, James Hogg whose parentage is obscure. He may have been son of Charles and Susanna Hogg, above, but definite proof of his ancestry is not available. My wish to include all available York and/or Gloucester County records makes it necessary to record here these court items.

James Hogg married Rebecca Wornom (marriage bond not available). He made his will May 20, 1821. Excerpts of the will follow: (14)

In the name of God, amen, I, James Hogg of York County and state of Virginia, being in ill health - - - make this my last will and testament - -. I give to my dearly beloved wife after my just debts are paid, all of my estate both real and personal except one hundred dollars which I give to my Aunt Sarah Spencer provided my wife should not be with child within nine months from the date of this will. But if my wife should prove with child - - - then the above given are to be void, and to be given to my wife and her child or children that she may have within the above named nine months.

- - - I then give her one third part of my estate and the other two thirds to my child or children. I do appoint my friend Joseph Crockett my Executor to this my last will - - this 20th day of May 1821.

Witnesses: William Tabb                      signed James X Hogg.

At a Court held June 18, 1821 this will was proved. The Executor Joseph Crockett had as his securities Lewis Hogg and Henry Guy - - - their Bond - - \$1200.00.

Inventory and appraisement took place July 28, 1821.<sup>(15)</sup> Account of Sales was recorded October 31, 1821 and returned to court January 21, 1822.

Rebecca Wornom Hogg had a daughter named Elizabeth James Hogg. The widow married Charles B. Ironmonger September 23, 1822.<sup>(16)</sup> He became guardian of the infant and on November 12, 1822 the following receipt was made:

"I, Charles B. Ironmonger, being guardian to the orphan of James Hogg dec'd., have this day received of Joseph Crockett the full amount of the estate of the deceased. November 12, 1822. (signed) Charles B. Ironmonger." Teste: Kemp P. Elliott; Wm. Tabb; Thomas Minson.<sup>(17)</sup>

The Guardian's Accounts over the years are itemized, and on February 10, 1842 there was due her as a final settlement \$79.32. Elizabeth James Hogg married James More (Moore?) brother of Amos More, according to an old Ironmonger letter, written about 1890.

Lewis Hogg Sr. (1773-1852).

Another Hogg family group, now of York County and elsewhere, had its beginnings in Gloucester County, according to census records but the link is missing that would connect them in the right spot. It is the record of Lewis Hogg Sr. and his many descendants, all of whom trace easily from 1773 to 1967. It seems probable, though not proven, that he was the son of Stephen Hogg (1753) or of George Hogg (1746) Stephen's brother. Lewis Hogg Sr. was born in Gloucester County, Va. in 1773;<sup>(18)</sup> married Nancy Wright in York County February 16, 1801<sup>(19)</sup>; purchased land in York County and reared a

family. The first wife died and Lewis Hogg Sr. married, secondly, Elizabeth Campbell, January 9, 1830.<sup>(20)</sup> She was born in 1788; her mother was a Miss Wright.

An extensive search has been made to find his parentage but it has produced only the authentic statement that he was born in Gloucester in 1773. Some of his descendants, as well as descendants of the two Hogg branches already traced, know that they were cousins but no one at this time can say by what route this cousinship developed.

The land transactions, in York County, of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup>, Sr., are of interest. Excerpts from the Court records are included:

"An Indenture, November 17, 1809;<sup>(21)</sup> between Anderson Freeman and Susanna Freeman, his wife of - - - Richmond, and Lewis Hogg of the County of York - - - rented a tract of land whereon Philliman Dedman, dec'd formerly lived, containing by estimation 25 acres, for 10 years at \$10. per year. Received \$20.00 in part on the above lease November 17, 1809." signed by Anderson Freeman;  
Susanna Freeman;  
Lewis X Hogg."

The following year the lease was renewed.<sup>(22)</sup>

"This indenture made 29 August 1810 between Mary Dedman of the County of York and Lewis Hogg of aforesaid County. Mary Dedman rented to Hogg that tract of land whereon Philliman Dedman dec'd, formerly lived, containing by estimation 25 acres with all houses, orchards etc for 10 years for \$10. per year."

Lewis Hogg began plans to buy the Dedman land.<sup>(23)</sup>

"This indenture made July 15, 1811 between Peyton Southall and Helen Southall his wife of the town and county of York and state of Virginia of one part, and Lewis Hogg of county and state aforesaid, of the other part. Witnesses for the sum of \$210.00 - - - to them, the said Peyton and Helen in hand paid, the receipt - - - they have granted, sold etc. unto Lewis Hogg - - - a parcel of land being 1/3 part of the tract of land whereof Philip (Philliman) Dedman died seized - - - lying and being in the County of York and state aforesaid which the said Southall purchased of one Anderson Freeman and wife of the City of Richmond (see deed to him September 5, 1810) which said Freeman held the same in right of his wife Susanna Dedman (daughter of said Phillip, one of the three devisees) - - - This portion of land is bounded:

East by land of said Southall; West by land of Thomas Patrick, North by that portion allotted and set apart for Mary Dedman, another of the devisees - - -; South by the remaining part of the aforesaid 75 acres which said portion fell to said Southall under the deviseion - - to have and to hold, unto him the said Lewis Hogg etc.

(signed) Peyton Southall; Helen Southall  
October 21, 1811 recorded. Samuel Sheild cyc."

Five days later Lewis Hogg negotiated for the second share of the tract of land: (24)

"July 20, 1811; Witness that the said Mary Dedman for \$120.00 sold to Lewis Hogg in Parish of York-Hampton, County of York - - 25 acres - - - beginning at a cedar on the road leading to the house so as to take in the new (or now?) dwelling house and orchard and 1/3 of the woodland which said piece or parcel of land passed and descended to the said Mary Dedman as representing her father Philliman Dedman (signed) Mary X Dedman.

Witnessed by Peyton Southall: John Davis:  
Peyton Smith; William Lee.

Admitted to record March 16, 1812."

In 1818 Lewis Hogg bought some adjoining land, and twenty years later he bought an additional tract. (25)

"February 16, 1818, this indenture between Robert Gibbons of town and County of York and Mary his wife, of the first part and Lewis Hogg the other part, for the sum of \$144.00 to him in hand paid by said Lewis Hogg - - a piece of land in York-Hampton Parish containing 18 acres, 10 acres of this on south side of main stage road leading from York to Hampton and bounded: North by the road; East by Gibbons; South by land of Peyton Southall, dec'd; West by land of Thomas Patrick; the other 8 acres being at the upper end of the plantation formerly held by Phillip Dedman; Gibbons bought it of Ann Smith and she heired it from her father, Phillip Dedman. Recorded April 20, 1818."

"Deed; (26) between the Southalls and Lewis Hogg, \$800.00 paid by Lewis Hogg for 135½ acres in York County: Bounded, beginning at a corner formerly Dedman's and running that line by marked trees - - to Mitchells, thence that line - - - - - to a chestnut on Stedman's line - - to the end of a ditch, thence by marked trees - - - South - - to an intersection of

the dividing line - - - May 24, 1838." It was signed by eight persons including Peyton A. Southall Jr.

By these transactions Lewis Hogg acquired adjoining tracts of land totaling 203½ acres. August 16, 1839, he sold to his son-in-law Lewis Spencer, 15 acres, "bounded on East by land of Richard Garrett (presently, Marlebank); South by the stage road, West and North by lands of Thomas Newman." (27)

His home and plantation of 203½ acres was known as Hogg's Field and remained in possession of this branch of the family more than half a century. It is the land on which the York High School, Yorktown Elementary School, St. Joan of Arc Catholic Church, Crooks Memorial Methodist Church (second location) and the community of Edge Hill, Yorktown have been built (1967) and other outlying lands.

Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr.'s marriage to Nancy Wright of York County has already been mentioned. It took place February 16, 1801. (28) They had five children: (29)

- I. Lucy Hogg<sup>2</sup>, born 1802;
- II. George Hogg<sup>2</sup>, born 1804;
- III. Lewis Hogg<sup>2</sup> the Younger, born ca 1805;
- IV. Benjamin Hogg<sup>2</sup>, born ca. 1807;
- V. Edward Hogg<sup>2</sup>, born 1810.

Nancy Wright Hogg, mother of these children died after they reached maturity, and Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. married, secondly Miss Elizabeth Campbell, January 9, 1830. (28) Elizabeth Campbell's parents were John Campbell and Elizabeth Wright, who were married December 24, 1787. After Campbell's death the widow married Benjamin Stroud, a widower by whom she had no living children. Stroud died in 1810. Elizabeth Campbell was reared in the home of her Stroud step-father and may have been called Elizabeth Stroud, but her marriage bond naming Elizabeth Campbell, and will of her uncle William Wright that follows, give proof of her name.

Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. and his second wife, Elizabeth Campbell Hogg had one son,  
VI Alexander Hogg<sup>2</sup>, born October 10, 1830. (30)

The will of William Wright is proof of the foregoing relationship: (31)

"I will to my sister Elizabeth Stroud during her life or widowhood - - - ; to my nephew, Benjamin Stroud - - - ; the rest to be divided between Elizabeth Stroud and my niece, Elizabeth Campbell. November 28, 1820; proved December 18, 1820. Witnessed by Willey Hogg, John Hogg Jr., G. Layne Corbin Jr."

The records, to be included, show that three of the sons of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. and Nancy Bright Hogg pre-deceased their father and there were no descendants of them when Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. made his will in 1852, therefore no mention of George<sup>2</sup>, Lewis the Younger<sup>2</sup> and Benjamin Hogg<sup>2</sup> is made in his will. Following is his will: (32)

"The last will and testament of Lewis Hogg Sr. of the County of York and State of Virginia, made this 16th day of February, 1852. First: I desire all of my just debts to be paid by my executor hereafter to be named.

Second: I lend to my son Alexander Hogg my tract of land on which I now reside, called Dedmans, together with all the houses, appurtenances etc until the first day of the second January after my decease.

Third: I give to my son Alexander Hogg after my death my tract of land called Southalls, it being the land I purchased from Southall's heirs, forever. The boundaries to be fixed according to the deed made to me together with all the houses etc., to him and to his heirs forever.

Fourth: I give to my said son, Alexander after my death, my servants Charles, Jim and Hannah. I also give my said son Alexander my horses, hogs and cattle of every description not otherwise directed, my household and kitchen furniture, farming utensils, growing crops if any, together with all the residue of my estate not otherwise disposed of, to him and his heirs forever.

Fifth: I give to my son Edward Hogg, the possession to be given on the first day of the second January after my death, the tract of land on which I now reside called Dedmans, all houses, appurtenances etc to him and his heirs forever.

Sixth: I give to my daughter Lucy Spencer, out of my stock, one cow and calf as first choice.

Seventh: I give to my grandson William Spencer out of my stock one cow and calf, he to select them as second choice.

Eighth: I do hereby appoint my friend Stafford Cooke my sole executor to this my last will and testament, and I do further request that the Court not require of him to give security. Signed the day and year above written. Lewis X Hogg.

This will was proved in York Court December 20, 1852 by the oaths of three of the witnesses and ordered to be recorded; and Stafford Cooke the executor named in said will personally appeared in Court and refused to take upon himself the burthen of the execution thereof, on motion of Alexander Hogg who made oath thereto and entered into bond for \$1500.00 (no security being required) - - - certificate is granted the said Alexander Hogg for - - - letters of administration on the said decedent's estate - - - teste Bolivar Shield clc.

Alexander Hogg's bond dated December 20, 1852 was also found among the York County loose papers. An Inventory, appraisement and Account of Sales of the personal estate of Lewis Hogg Sr, deceased was taken December 30, 1852. Three slaves, valued at \$720.00 (not sold) were willed to Alexander Hogg. R. R. Garrett and S. G. Cooke were the appraisers. S. G. Cooke was keeper of the sales account and reported to the court on February 21, 1853 and it was ordered to be recorded. (33)

I. Lucy Hogg<sup>2</sup>, first child of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. and Nancy Wright Hogg, married Lewis Spencer January 4, 1823. (34) They had two sons,

- A. William<sup>3</sup> Spencer, born ca 1825;
- B. Benjamin<sup>3</sup> Spencer, born 1827. (census).

On November 15, 1846 Lewis Spencer made his will which was proved December 20, 1847. He bequeathed the land bought from his father-in-law in the following manner: (35)

"I, Lewis Spencer of the County of York and State of Virginia - - - make and ordain this my last will and testament. Item, first - - - . Item, second, I lend to my beloved wife as long as she lives all my property both real and personal for her use and support. Item, third, after the death of my said wife I give the land upon which I now live to my son Benjamin Spencer upon condition that said Benjamin shall pay his brother William Spencer \$50 lawful money, but should said Benjamin refuse to pay his brother William the said \$50, I then give my son William Spencer the aforesaid land upon condition that he pay his brother Benjamin \$50 as aforesaid. But should both - - refuse - - I authorize - - my executor to sell the land named to the best advantage - - and divide the proceeds equally between my two children, Benjamin and William or their heirs. Item fourth: all property loaned my wife - - equally divided between my two mentioned children. - - - Item fifth: - Robert R. Throckmorton - - - executor."

B. Benjamin<sup>3</sup> Spencer, second son of Lewis Spencer and Lucy Hogg<sup>2</sup> Spencer, born 1827, married Ellen Virginia Wornom and they had one son Benjamin D.<sup>4</sup> Spencer. The father died in 1853 and the court appointed Kemp E. Minson and William Rowe on March 20, 1853, as commissioners to make an inventory and appraisement of the estate. It was recorded August 20, 1855. (38) On November 19, 1855 Mrs. Ellen Virginia Spencer and Charles A. Hopkins were appointed guardians of Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Spencer, orphan of Benjamin Spencer Sr. (39) Later the mother married, secondly, John H. Dillard. After her death, Dillard married Mrs. Rebecca Acree, widow, and when he made his will November 29, 1880 he bequeathed to his step-son Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Spencer the most of his property. The will stated:

"That my dearly beloved wife Rebecca shall have - - - one third of all my real and personal estate - - - except (certain) personal property taken out - - spoons which have initials of my daughter engraven on the handles which I give to Benjamin D. Spencer, the son of my deceased wife - - - two other spoons - - - all my beds - - - I had when my deceased wife Ellen died. Item I lend to said Benjamin D. Spencer - - - balance bonds, deeds - - - of every description - - - if he marry, to his children at his death - - -" Probated February 3, 1881. (40)

1. Benjamin D.<sup>4</sup> Spencer, only child of Benjamin<sup>3</sup> Spencer, Sr., born October 8, 1852, married Julia Nottingham May 10, 1882. They had four children:

(A) Rodney H.<sup>5</sup> Spencer, born July 28, 1883; married Pauline Stroud, December 25, 1905, died 1907. No children.

(B) Harry<sup>5</sup> Spencer, born May 27, 1885; married Sadelia Ann Wornom April 27, 1909. She was born May 15, 1890. They had one daughter,

Benjamin D.<sup>4</sup> Spencer, father of these children, died November 3, 1924.

II. George Hogg<sup>2</sup>, the second child of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. and Nancy Wright Hogg, born about 1804 married Mary Peters. A deed of gift from Rebecca Peters April 23, 1833 is of record. It said: "to my daughter, Mary Hogg, the wife of George Hogg," and it was witnessed by Lewis Spencer. (41)

They had no children. He died in May 1847. His brother, Edward Hogg<sup>2</sup> gave bond as his executor June 21, 1847. (York County Loose Papers). His will follows: (42)

"In the name of God, amen, I, George Hogg of the County of York and State of Virginia - - - this my last will - - - First, I lend to my beloved wife, Mary Hogg after the payment of my just debts and funeral expenses, all my property of every description whatsoever during her natural life.

Secondly, after the death of my wife I desire that my property be divided between the children then living of my brother Edward Hogg and my sister Lucy Spencer - two thirds of which I give to the former and one third to the later. Lastly, I constitute and appoint my brother Edward Hogg executor - - - this 3rd day of May 1847.

(signed) George Hogg.

Witnesses Wm. H. Shield

George W. Eray.

Will proved May 17, 1847.

The inventory, appraisement and account of sales showed \$518.00 personal property and three slaves, valued at \$825.00. (43)

III. Lewis Hogg<sup>2</sup> the Younger, third child of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. and Nancy Wright Hogg was born about 1805. He died unmarried, May 18, 1840. His death was recorded in the register of the Grafton Christian Church.

IV. Benjamin Hogg<sup>2</sup>, fourth child of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. and Nancy Wright Hogg, was born about 1807. He married Fanny \_\_\_\_\_ and they had one son,

A. Benjamin Hogg<sup>3</sup> Jr. The father died in 1828 and his brother Lewis Hogg<sup>2</sup> the Younger was appointed guardian of the orphan.<sup>(44)</sup> Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. was administrator of the estate. The Court ordered an inventory, appraisement and account of sales November 20-21, 1828; "and John Garrett, William Vail, Lewis Fox and John Hogg were appointed January 18, 1830 to examine Lewis Hogg's account of his administration on the estate of Benjamin Hogg dec'd and make report to the Court." It was recorded June 21, 1830.<sup>(45)</sup> The orphan, Benjamin Hogg<sup>3</sup> Jr. died in infancy.

V. Edward Hogg<sup>2</sup>, fifth child of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. and Nancy Wright Hogg was born in 1810.<sup>(46)</sup> He married Clarentine Clark of Williamsburg. She was a lineal descendant of two Revolutionary War soldiers, James Clarke<sup>(47)</sup> and John Lee. The record stated:

"June 16, 1834; on motion of Ann Thomas that James Clarke in the Revolutionary War died intestate and his heirs are Ann Clarke and Philmer Clarke; that Ann Clarke has, since the death of said James Clarke, intermarried with Thomas Tommas; that Philmer Clarke is dead leaving John Clarke, Thomas Clarke and Clarentine Clarke who has intermarried with Edward Hogg, and Robert Clarke an infant; that Philmer Clarke left a widow, Lavenia who is now living (1834)."<sup>(48)</sup>

"On motion of Walker Hubbard the court doth certify from satisfactory evidence adduced, that John Lee, who is reputed to have been an officer in the war of the Revolution, died intestate in the County of York, on \_\_\_ day in February, 1821, and left issue, Alpha who has intermarried with Allen Scott, Elizabeth who has intermarried with Charles Hansford, Sarah who has intermarried with Walker Hubbard, Martha who has intermarried with Robert P. Shelburn, and Lavenia who intermarried with Philmer Clarke and who are the only heirs of John Lee."<sup>(49)</sup>

The marriage of Edward Hogg<sup>2</sup> and Clarentine Clark took place May 21, 1832.<sup>(50)</sup> They had six children:

The death date of Edward Hogg<sup>2</sup> was not available, but it was known that he died just prior to the Civil War. The mother died after 1877; see the following deed:<sup>(52)</sup>

"January 13, 1877, this deed between Clementine (Clarentine) Hogge, George W. Hogge and Emma J. Hogge his wife, Thomas Enos Hogge and Martha Hogge his wife, Thomas Hogge, William Fox and Mary E. Fox, his wife and Amanda R. Hogge all of first part, to Peter B. Brooks, for \$80.00 sold 4 acres in York County, more or less, being the west half of the original 8 acres of cleared land as cut off to the said Clarentine Hogge and bounded on North by S. G. Cooke; South by land of Alexander Hogge; on East by other half of said 8 acres of cleared land, now owned by Robert Randall; on West by land of Amanda R. Hogge." This was a part of the land heired from their father Edward Hogg<sup>2</sup>, who in turn, heired it from his father, Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. A granddaughter, now 96 years old related some of the Civil War experiences of her grandmother, Clarentine Clark Hogge and her family. At the outbreak of the war, her oldest son, Enos was at the College of William and Mary as an adult student (being 25 years old) or engaged in some other educational pursuit. He and the second son, George, who was scarcely eighteen years old, soon joined the army of the Southern Confederacy. Jackson Tolliver, one of the slaves belonging to the family, went with them. He cooked and washed for the soldiers, and there was such a bond of affection between master and slave, that as long as both lived George Hogg would have divided his scant holdings with Jackson if he had need.

The oldest daughter died, and the mother, with her three young children, Tommy, Mary Lizzie and Amanda went back to Williamsburg to her parents home. During the Peninsula Campaign of the Civil War, this Hogg plantation was overrun, by the Northern soldiers. The home was ransacked, and pillaged, the house burned, the fences destroyed, all livestock was taken and the once prosperous farm was reduced to ruin. Before the mother left for Williamsburg she buried the family silver in a corner of the garden for safe-keeping from the enemy. After the war, it was never found. Whether the yankees found it, or the freed slaves dug it up, no one ever knew. After the war, the land was divided into six shares, for the five children and the widow, and in time it was sold in small homesites to the freed negroes.

The death date of Thomas Enos Hogge<sup>3</sup> Sr., oldest son of George Hogge<sup>2</sup> and Clarentine Clark Hogg, is not available. It took place before 1887. After his death his widow married John W. Williams. "On December 14, 1887 Martha Williams and husband John W. Williams sold three acres of land in Goodwins Neck for \$34.00 to Thomas Hogge." As Thomas Hogge was only a lad at that time he was assisted in this legal transaction by his mother Mrs. Martha E. Fox Hogge Williams. (57)

F. Amanda Hogg<sup>3</sup>, sixth and youngest child of Edward Hogg<sup>2</sup> and Clarentine Clark Hogg, born in 1857 married Frederick Burcher Sr., a widower, August 14, 1879. They had three children:

3. Nettie<sup>4</sup> Burcher.

1. Mamie<sup>4</sup> Burcher married Robert W. Wilson. They had seven children:

This completes all available data on descendants of V. Edward Hogg<sup>2</sup> and his wife Clarentine Clark Hogg. He was the fifth child of his parents, Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. and Nancy Wright Hogg. The tracing of the family through his sixth and youngest child follows. - "the child of his old age."

VI. Alexander Hogg<sup>2</sup>, sixth and youngest child of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup>, and only child of his second wife, Elizabeth Campbell Hogg, was born October 10, 1830, on a farm near Yorktown. Before he was ten years old, his grandmother bequeathed him all of her property. The will stated:(63)

"March 15, 1837. I lend my beloved daughter, Elizabeth Hogg, all my property, both real and personal, at present consisting of two negroes named Jack and Phil, two cows and two featherbeds and furniture, three silver tablespoons and six teaspoons, in a word, all the estate that I shall die possessed of - - - to be enjoyed by her during the minority of my grandson Alexander Hogg.

Item 3: It is my will and desire that my said grandson

Alexander Hogg, when he shall arrive at the age of 21 years or shall marry, shall have the above named property and all my estate - - - .

Item 4: But if my daughter Elizabeth Hogg shall die before my grandson Alexander Hogg shall arrive at the age of 21 or marries - - - - my will is - - - - my said grandson shall come into immediate possession of all my estate both real and personal instead of waiting until he arrives at age 21 or marries.

I appoint my son-in-law Lewis Hogg my executor."

Witnesses: (signed) Elizabeth Stroud.  
R. R. Garrett,  
John C. Moreland. Probated January 20, 1840

"As a farm boy, Alexander Hogg<sup>2</sup> worked on the farm in summer but in winter he pursued his studies at the old-fashioned academy. When he completed the classes offered there, he determined to go to college. He chose the plan for further study, but ready money for college expenses was lacking and must be earned. This was done by teaching and surveying. There being no building suitable to teach in, he built with his own hands, a log school house. Soon thereafter, the young teacher entered Randolph-Macon College where he graduated in 1854 with the M.A. degree.

At the death of his father, which occurred during his second year in College, the Yorktown farm came into his possession, and although his interest was never again centered there, he could not be induced to part with it until he was past seventy years of age; this was his part and parcel of his native state.

Immediately upon his graduation from Randolph-Macon College he was employed by Jefferson Stubbs of Gloucester County and he opened a school for boys, giving of his first years' earnings, one hundred dollars to build the Cappahosic Academy." (64)

While in Gloucester he lived in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jefferson Stubbs and there he met Miss Eliza Buckner Cooke, a cousin of Mrs. Stubbs, whom he married December 29, 1859. (Gloucester Mg. Register)

Just after his marriage, he became a student at the University of Virginia, Charlottesville where he graduated with the L.L.D. degree.

---

This Cappahosic Academy which was built in the 1850's prior to the Civil War, is not to be confused with the ruins of a boys and girls negro preparatory school founded by a northerner named Weaver in the 1870's or 1880's in Gloucester County, Va.

After leaving the University, Professor Hogg continued in his chosen profession, accepting the position of professor of Latin and Greek in the Murfreesboro College for young men in North Carolina. At this time the Civil War broke out, the College closed its doors in 1862 and he returned to Gloucester County and reopened his old school. Soon he joined the Confederate army as a cavalryman. His services were completely absorbed in nursing the wounded soldiers. After the Civil War he was professor in the following schools: Wesleyan Female College, North Carolina; Washington College, Chestertown, Maryland; Agricultural and Mechanical College of Alabama; and the A and M College of Texas.

In the fall of 1882, Professor Hogg's noteworthy connection with the schools of Fort Worth, Texas took place - that work which entitled him to be named as the "Father of the School System of Fort Worth." He retired in 1906 having served for 24 years as superintendent of schools in Fort Worth, Waxahachie and Dallas. (65) There is a school building in Fort Worth named in his honor, the "Alexander Hogg Elementary School of Fort Worth, Texas."

Professor Alexander Hogg visited friends and relatives in York and Gloucester Counties occasionally, after settling in Fort Worth. One such visit took place in September 1908 and a news item in the York Reporter, weekly newspaper of Hampton and York County recorded the visit as,

"Professor Alex Hogge (note the spelling) of Texas, is visiting friends in York County."

To this personal item the professor felt called upon to reply, and thus "set the record straight" as to the correct spelling of his name. The next week's edition of the York Reporter carried his comment and reply, as follows:

"Editor York Reporter: Dear Sir, - Doubtless you intended the above 'personal' as a compliment to myself, and for which please accept my thanks. But you are mistaken as to the family (or "breed"). My father lived for eighty-five years, and always spelled his name Hogg. He was very proud of the family name; so am I. - - -

If any one wishes to look into the genealogy of this branch of the family (there seems to be other Hogs), it will be found in Murray's Biographical Dictionary - - -. I am not acquainted with the family spelling their name with an appended "e" and feel that they must be an entirely separate and new family, not related at all to,

(65) A correspondence with Alexander Hogg's daughter, Miss Marie Lulie Hogg of Fort Worth, Texas from 1938 to 1955 provided data on Alexander Hogg and his descendants.



Alexander Hogg<sup>2</sup> and his wife Eliza B. Cooke Hogg had four children:

- A. Mary Lulie Hogg<sup>3</sup>, born April 9, 1865;
- B. Walter Delaney Hogg<sup>3</sup>, born July 17, 1867;
- C. Virginia Dabney Hogg<sup>3</sup>, born March 17, 1869;
- D. Julia Ellen Hogg<sup>3</sup>, born about 1872.

In 1900 Alexander Hogg had a handsome colonial home of "gracious architecture, traditional beauty and generous proportions", built in Fort Worth, after having lived in that city 18 years. The same year (1900) his wife, Eliza B. Cooke Hogg died. The funeral service for her was conducted in the home. After her death the father gave the home to his eldest daughter Mary Lulie Hogg who continued to live in it 55 years. The father resided with her the balance of his life. He died in Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, Md. August 10, 1911 and was buried in Fort Worth.

A. Mary Lulie Hogg<sup>3</sup>, first child of Alexander Hogg<sup>2</sup> and Eliza B. Cooke Hogg, born April 9, 1865 was educated at La Sell Seminary at Auburndale, Massachusetts, and Emerson School of Oratory in Boston. She devoted her life to the care and education of two of her nieces and two nephews. She was a member of First Methodist Church of Fort Worth more than 70 years. In 1950 she was honored by the Fort Worth's National Bank, as the longest continuous stockholder of the bank. She never married. She died October 4, 1955, aged 90 years.

B. Walter Delaney Hogg<sup>3</sup>, second child of Alexander Hogg<sup>2</sup> and Eliza B. Cooke Hogg, born July 17, 1867; died November 29, 1867 and was buried in Valley Front cemetery in Gloucester County, Va., the family graveyard of the Stubbs family. A simple headstone marks the grave.

C. Virginia Dabney Hogg<sup>3</sup>, called "Nannie", third child of Alexander Hogg<sup>2</sup> and Eliza B. Cooke Hogg, born March 17, 1869 married William P. Wynne of Fort Worth and they had three children:

1. Richard M.<sup>4</sup> Wynne,
2. L. Pauline<sup>4</sup> Wynne, and
3. William P.<sup>4</sup> Wynne Jr.

After the death of her husband, Mrs. Virginia Dabney Hogg<sup>3</sup> Wynne lived with her sister, Miss Mary Lulie Hogg<sup>3</sup>. She was an invalid about 10 years. She died the first part of 1949.

1. Richard M.<sup>4</sup> Wynne, first child of William P. Wynne and Virginia D. Hogg<sup>3</sup> Wynne, married Rachel Leona Kafferty. Prior to his marriage he served four years in the U.S. Navy. He reenlisted in World War II in the navy, as gunner's mate. They had three sons,

- (A) Richard M.<sup>5</sup> Wynne Jr. who is married and has children;
- (B) William Laurence<sup>5</sup> Wynne who married; had no children; died of an automobile accident in October 1948; and
- (C) Warren Giles<sup>5</sup> Wynne, married and has a child.

All three of these Wynne men saw active duty in World War II.

2. L. Pauline<sup>4</sup> Wynne, second child of William P. Wynne and Virginia D. Hogg<sup>3</sup> Wynne, was educated by her aunt, Miss Mary Lulie Hogg at Texas University. She married John P. Muller and they have one son, John P.<sup>5</sup> Muller Jr.

3. William P.<sup>4</sup> Wynne, third and youngest child of William P. Wynne and Virginia D. Hogg<sup>3</sup> Wynne was graduated from Randolph-Macon College, Virginia. His aunt assumed the responsibility for his schooling. He married Merle Carter.

D. Julia Ellen Hogg<sup>3</sup>, fourth and youngest child of Alexander Hogg<sup>2</sup> and Eliza B. Cooke Hogg, born ca. 1872, was a graduate of LaSelle Seminary, Auburndale, Mass. She married Judge Thomas Jefferson Powell, a former mayor of Fort Worth and they had three children,

- 1. Margaret Buckner<sup>4</sup> Powell;
- 2. Thomas Jefferson<sup>4</sup> Powell Jr., born in 1899;
- 3. Alexander Kyle<sup>4</sup> Powell, born December 24, 1902.

Mrs. Julia Ellen Hogg<sup>3</sup> Powell mother of these children died in November 1911 and their aunt, Miss Mary Lulie Hogg<sup>3</sup> assisted considerably in the upbringing of these children. She educated Margaret, sending her to LaSelle Seminary where both the mother Julia Ellen Hogg<sup>3</sup> and the aunt, Mary Lulie Hogg<sup>3</sup> had graduated in the 1880's and 1890's.

1. Margaret Buckner<sup>4</sup> Powell married Curtis A. Hertig of Fort Worth. They made their home in Eastland, Texas, where Hertig was secretary of Eastland Rotary Club and associated with Eastland Gas Company. They had no children. Curtis A. Hertig died suddenly April 18, 1949.

2. Thomas Jefferson<sup>4</sup> Powell Jr., second child of Thomas Jefferson Powell and Julia Ellen Hogg<sup>3</sup> Powell, was born in 1899 and died in the influenza epidemic of 1919. He was unmarried.

- 3. Alexander Kyle<sup>4</sup> Powell, third and youngest child of

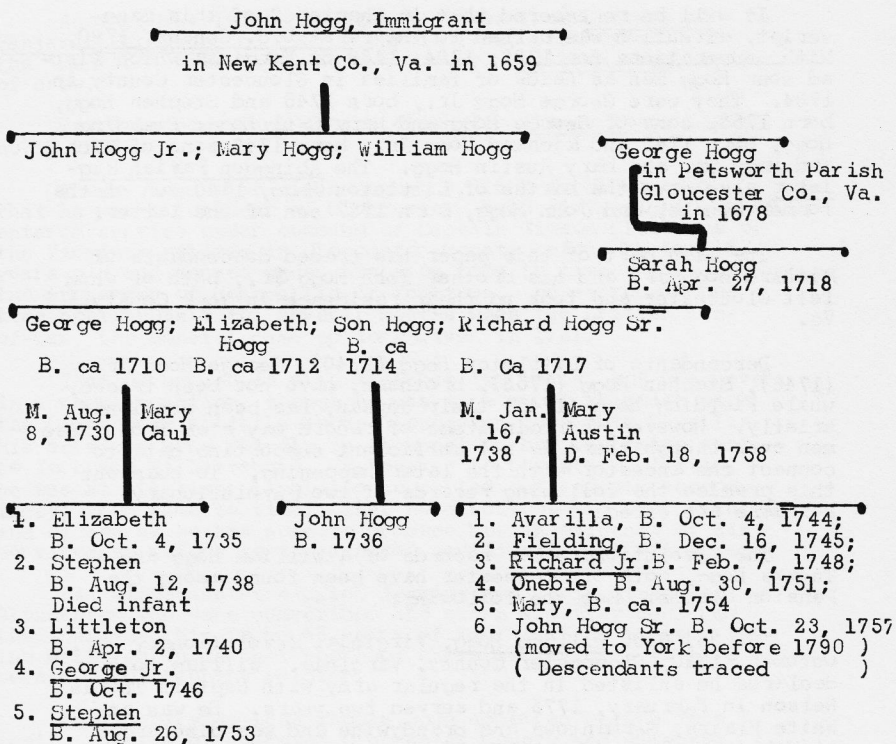
Thomas Jefferson Powell and Julia Ellen Hogg<sup>3</sup> Powell was born December 24, 1902. His aunt sent him to Massachusetts in his early youth to attend Harvard Prep. School. He was active in athletics. He married Laura Louise Jones of Texarkana, Texas in 1929 and they lived in El Paso, where he was appointed head of the City Bureau of Vital Statistics by Judge R. E. Thomason. He held the position 22 years. They had no children. He died April 19, 1949 in El Paso.

This brings to a close the tracing of descendants of VI. Alexander Hogg<sup>2</sup> and his wife Eliza Buckner Cooke Hogg. He was the youngest son of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup> Sr. and his second wife, Elizabeth Campbell.<sup>(67)</sup> Having traced all of Lewis Hogg<sup>1</sup>'s children and their descendants this completes their family tracing from 1773 through 1967.

## 2. B. Other Hoggs of Gloucester or Gloucester Background.

It will be remembered that in Chapter 2 of this manuscript, attention was called to the First U.S. Census, 1790, With Enumerations for 1782; 1784; 1786 of Virginia which listed four Hogg men as heads of families in Gloucester County in 1784. They were George Hogg Jr., born 1746 and Stephen Hogg, born 1753, sons of George Hogg and Mary Caul Hogg; Fielding Hogg, born 1745 and Richard Hogg Jr., born 1748 sons of Richard Hogg Sr. and Mary Austin Hogg. The Abingdon Parish Register also gave the births of Littleton Hogg, 1740 son of the former couple, and John Hogg, born 1757 son of the latter.

The main part of this paper has traced descendants of Richard Hogg Jr. and his brother John Hogg Sr., both of whom left Gloucester and took up their residence in York County, Va.

Descendants of Littleton Hogg (1740), George Hogg Jr. (1746), Stephen Hogg (1753), brothers, have not been traced, while Fielding Hogg (1745) their cousin, has been mentioned briefly. However, certain items of record may stem from these men even though there is not sufficient supporting data to connect the ancestor with the later happening. To bear out this premise the following records of two Revolutionary soldiers are cited:

The Revolutionary War records of a William Hogg and a Thomas Hogg, both of Gloucester have been found among the Pension Claims. See the following:

"S. 38, 040. William Hogg, Virginia. Revolutionary War. October, 1820, Gloucester County, Virginia. William Hogg declares he enlisted in the regular army with Captain Thomas Nelson in February, 1775 and served two years. He was at White Plains, Germantown and Brandywine and was discharged at Valley Forge by General Muhlenburg. Schedule of property enumerated, valued at \$63.37 $\frac{1}{2}$ . 4 May, 1818; William (X) Hogg of Gloucester County deposes he entered service in February, 1775 under Captain Thomas Nelson and served until February, 1778. 4 July, 1818, William Hogg aged about 60, of Gloucester County,

4 July 1832, William Hogg declares he served under Captain Thomas Nelson in the regiment of Col. John Green. William Hogg of Gloucester, Virginia, private in First Regiment commanded by Capt. Nelson for two years was placed on the Virginia pension roll at \$8.00 per month from 4 July, 1818 under Act of 18 March, 1818. Certificate 6008 was issued 29 January 1819."

From the above statement that he was about 60 years old in 1818 it is estimated that he was born about 1758. He

may have been a son of Littleton Hogg (1740).

Another Revolutionary item is taken from Letters of Benjamin Harrison, p. 190: "Council 1782, List of crew of the Tentor under Capt. George Goosby. William Hogg, member of crew."

Revolutionary War Pension claim for Thomas Hogg. Claim no. S. 5566.

Thomas Hogg made claim August 6, 1832 at Gloucester that he was a resident of Gloucester, aged sixty-eight years; entered service under command of Captain Gipson Cluverius of the Virginia militia in Gloucester County before he was 16 years old and served under him from time to time until after the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown. He served at one time continuously for several months when the British Man-of-War, the Bonetol came up York River in 1781.

That he served in all, at least two years, but was never in a regular action, though he was in a smart skirmish with the Lighthouse a little above Gloucester town near Lewellin. His services were chiefly in Gloucester, but was twice sent to York and Williamsburg. Belonging to the State Militia, he was at all times liable to be called out and was accordingly, from time to time. That no discharge was ever granted and of course he has none to produce but in evidence of his services he refers to the annexed certificates of witnesses.

His witnesses were Caleb Jenkins and Lewis Stokes of Gloucester who were subscribed and sworn and they declared they believed him to be 68 years of age; that he is reported and believed in the neighborhood where he resides, to have been a Revolutionary soldier.

On February 8, 1833 Thomas Hogg appeared before John F. Scott, Justice of Peace of Gloucester County and made the additional statement in order to obtain the benefits of the Act of Congress of June 7, 1832:

That his first services were under Captain Gipson Cluverius in Gloucester County near the mouth of York River, at which place he served three months. His next services were at Gloucester Town at which place he served under Captain Samuel Iddings of the Artillery, Capt. Cluverius and Capt. John Thruston for nine months. That he served in Williamsburg for eight months. He was then brought to Yorktown and served at that place and at Seawell's Ordinary in Gloucester County for two months. That the next place at which he served was Perrins, a short distance below Gloucester Town, at which place he served for at least three months and was in regular service at that place in the militia when Lord Cornwallis surrendered at Yorktown on the 19th of October, 1781.

Certificate of Pension issued 26 April 1833.

On 24 April 1851 Thomas Hogg of Gloucester applied for an increase in his pension, at which time he was receiving \$50.00 per annum.

On April 28, 1852 Increase in pension was granted." (Quoted from Pensions II a U.S. Printed book compiled about 1833-34).

From his claim that he was 68 years of age in 1832, it is estimated that he was born in 1764. It is possible that he was the son of Littleton Hogg (1740), Fielding Hogg (1745) or of George Hogg Jr. (1746).

The following letter carried in the Virginia Gazette of September 8, 1774 is of interest:

"Letter to the printer, from Fincastle, Va., August 13, 1774.

Dear Sir:- I received your favor by Thomas Edgar with the papers, for which I am much obliged to you. In return please to accept of the following intelligence from the Frontiers which if necessary may be supported by the most indubitable authority.

In the course of this summer a number of our people have been killed or captured by the Northern Indians - - - Mr. Thomas Hogg and two men near the mouth of the great Kenawah, Walker Kelley with three or four other persons, below the Falls of the river (captured), and a long list of murders, killings, prisoners, men, women and children.

If anything happens for the future, worthy of notice, you shall be punctually informed of it by your humble servant, - William Preston."

Other descendants of early Hogs in Gloucester County were included in Muster Rolls of War of 1812 for Gloucester County, Va., pp. 266-288. They were:

James Hogg, private;  
Richard Hogg, private;  
William Hogg, private.

Each served 3 months and 5 days. The names of John Hogg, William Hogg Jr., John Hogg Jr. and Daniel Hogg are on the Muster Rolls, but the length of their services were not given.

My own research on Gloucester County Hogs was centered on the Gloucester County Marriage Register No. 1; 1854-1894, and the copy of an old original county tax book for 1770-71.

In the Marriage Register there are 19 marriages in which

one of the contracting party was Hogg, beginning in 1854 and going through 1866. (1) They were:

William Hogg, born 1810, son of Daniel and Catherine Hogg;  
 Lewis Hogg, born 1818, son of Lewis and Leah Hogg;  
 Mildred Hogg, born 1819, daughter of John and Milsey Hogg;

 John Richard Hogg, born 1835, son of William and Patsy Hogg;  
 Benjamin Hogg, born 1835, son of Warner and Susan Hogg;  
 Juliann Hogg, born 1835, daughter of John and Mary Hogg;  
 William Hogg, born 1836, son of William and Patsy Hogg;  
 William Hogg, born 1836, son of Vincent and Nancy Hogg;  
 Georgiana Hogg, born 1836, daughter of Warner and Susan Hogg;  
 Mary Jane Hogg, born 1836, daughter of James and Rosa Hogg;  
 Washington Hogg, born 1837, son of Thomas and Rebecca Hogg;  
 Andrew Hogg, born 1837, son of Richard and Mildred Hogg;  
 Elizabeth Hogg, born 1838, daughter of James and Rosa Hogg;  
 Margaret Hogg, born 1839, daughter of John and Julia Hogg;  
 Jemima Hogg, born 1841, daughter of Thomas and Rebecca Hogg;  
 Sarah Jane Hogg, born 1841, daughter of George and Rachel Hogg;  
 James M. Hogg, born 1841, son of William and Patsy Hogg;  
 James K. Hogg, born 1845, son of Washington and Elizabeth Hogg.

These 19 persons of the Hogg family came from 11 pairs of parents, some of them born as early as 1785-90. (John may have had three marriages). They were:

Warner and Susan Hogg; Daniel and Catherine Hogg; Vincent and Nancy Hogg; Lewis and Leah Hogg; William and Patsy Hogg; Richard and Mildred Hogg; Thomas and Rebecca Hogg; John and Milsey Hogg; James and Rosa Hogg; John and Julia Hogg; George and Rachel Hogg; John and Mary Hogg; Washington and Elizabeth Hogg. (1)

The loss of Gloucester's earliest records makes it impossible to identify the fathers of Warner, Daniel, Vincent Sr.; Lewis, William, Thomas, Washington, Richard, James, George and John, above.

Littleton (1740), George Jr. (1746), Stephen (1753) and Fielding Hogg (1745) were evidently their ancestors but no one knows who is the father of whom.

Mrs. Ellen Ironmonger Pearson of Hampton, whose grandmother was a native of Gloucester County, has done considerable family research among the people of Gloucester. I am indebted to her for the data which follows. Her sources of information were: interviews with Mr. Americus Hogge (called "Mex"), Mrs. Ellen Rose, Mrs. Lillian Hogge Lilly, Mrs. Effie Lee Robins Smith, Mrs. Hallie Sue Thomas Forrest; Bible records of Thomas
