Part II
Chapter 1.

Onebie Hogg²; Mary Hogg²

Onebie Hogg², the fourth child of Richard Hogg¹ Sr. and Mary Austin Hogg, was born August 30, 1751. Her birth record states "Onebie Hogg, daughter of Richard and Mary" was born etc.;⁽¹⁾ thus she is identified with this family group. There is no record available, to tell whether or not she grew to adulthood, married and left descendants.

Mary Hogg², fifth child of Richard Hogg¹ Sr. and Mary Austin Hogg was born about 1754. Her birth was not recorded in the Abingdon Parish Register, but she is identified as belonging to this family group by a bequest in the will of her brother, John Hogg² Sr. It said:

"I lend to my sister Mary Marshall the room she now occupies upstairs as long as she is disposed to remain in it."⁽²⁾

Mary Hogg² and Solomon Marshall were married June 5, 1814; John Ranton and Peyton Smith were named as security and witness to the marriage bond.⁽³⁾ Solomon Marshall was a widower when Mary Hogg married him, having been married to Famin Jordan March 6, 1809. It is presumed that Marshall was dead when John Hogg² made his will in 1841.

There were no children of this Marshall - Hogg marriage.
The death date of Mary Hogg² Marshall was not available.

Part II
Chapter 2.

John Hogg² Sr. and Descendants

John Hogg², sixth and youngest child of Richard Hogg¹ Sr. and Mary Austin Hogg, was born October 23, 1757 in Abingdon Parish, Gloucester County, Virginia.⁽¹⁾ His name does not appear in the 1784 and 1786 tax lists of Gloucester County, so it is presumed that he had moved to York County about this time. He was listed in the York County tax lists as John Hogg Senior, and from 1794 until his death in 1843, his name continued on the York tax list.

The name of his wife has not been found. In all available court records she is mentioned only as "Loving Wife." It is presumed they were married in Gloucester County as no marriage bond for them was found in the York County marriage bond book.

The family of Charles Hogg was in York County when John Hogg² Sr. and his wife came from Gloucester to York to make their home. The relationship of these two men is not clear but the records show that they were associated. When Charles Hogg died, John Hogg Sr. bought two thirds of a tract of land and the reversion of the other third at the death of Charles Hogg's widow. Prior to these land transactions, John Hogg had leased 44 acres of land on which he paid taxes as early as 1811.⁽²⁾

On June 15, 1812 the York County court appointed John Stedman, Corbin Griffin and Lewis Burt, Commissioners, to sell the Charles Hogg estate. It was purchased by John Hogg Sr. for 69 pounds and six shillings. The document stated that these "commissioners aforesaid, in consideration of the sum of 69 pounds and 6 shillings, current money of Virginia, to them in hand paid by the said John Hogg Senior, at or before the ensealing - - - the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have bargained and sold unto the said John Hogg, Senior, his heirs etc., two thirds of a certain tract of land of which the late Charles Hogg of the County of York, died possessed, and also the reversion of the other third part of the said tract of land which has been allotted to the widow of said Charles Hogg as her dower - - - the land lying and being in the County of York and containing by estimation 50 acres and bounded agreeable to the plat and survey - - - - to have and to hold the said two-thirds of the tract and also reversion of the other third - - - - all and singular premises - - - unto the said John Hogg, Senior, his heirs etc."⁽³⁾ A plat of the 50 acres is on record.⁽⁴⁾

Boundaries for this land were given as follows:

"Beginning on the main road which leads down into Goodwins Neck at a marked gum on the line which divided the lands of Walter Burwell from the land of the said Corbin Griffin, lately the land of William Stevenson, thence along

a ditch and a line of marked trees, to a corner white-oak to Burt's land, thence along Burt's line by marked trees to a stob opposite to, and in right angles with a ditch which leads through the lands of the said Griffin, thence along the said ditch and a line of new-marked trees in a direct course to a corner new marked gum on the side of the old Crab Neck Road, thence in a direct course from the said gum to a new marked wild cherry tree on the side of the said old road and now the main road which leads to Goodwins Neck, then down the main road its several turns to the beginning.-(5) This land had been purchased in 1804 by Charles Hogg from Dr. Corbin Griffin who was a wealthy and prominent land owner.

In 1814 John Hogg², Senior acquired the Wormley's Creek plantation which included two tracts of land, a 30 acre track, which adjoined his 50 acres that he bought in 1811, and another track of 142 acres, thus making a sizable plantation of 222 acres. During the 153 years since this land became Hogg property, many homes have been built on it; the land has been divided and subdivided, some of it sold and resold; sections of it have been heired by descendants of John Hogg and allowed to pass out of the family, while other areas have been treasured and developed. Because the York County ancestral home of this branch of the Hogg family (John², Richard¹ Sr.) was built on this homesite, it seems fitting to include the original Hogg deed:

"This indenture made March 21, 1814 between Thomas Griffin and Mary his wife of the town of York of the one part, and John Hogg Senior of the County of York of the other part, witnesseth that for and in consideration of the sum of 1500 and 55 Spanish milled dollars by the said John Hogg, Senior, to the said Thomas Griffin in hand paid at or before the sealing and delivery of these presents, the receipt whereof he doth hereby acknowledge and thereof acquit and discharge, the said John Hogg, Senior, his heirs, executors, administrators, they the said Thomas Griffin and Mary his wife, have granted, bargained etc., and by these presents do grant, bargain etc., unto the said John Hogg Senior, his heirs and assigns a certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in the parish of Charles and County of York containing by late survey 30 acres and situated on the southeast side of the road leading to Wormley's Creek and bounded as follows:

Beginning at a cedar stob at the corner of said John Hogg's 50 acres and on Lewis Burt's line, thence by said Burt's line - - - to a corner pine on Lewis Hansford's line, thence by said Hansford's line, north to - - - Hansford's corner in a road, thence by Fisher's line North and Northwest - - - to a white gum corner of Fisher, Griffin and said John Hogg's 50 acres, thence by said Hogg's line of trees as per his plat of said 50 acres, to the beginning cedar stob. Also one other tract, piece or parcel of land, containing by survey 142 acres, 3 acres whereof are situated on the southeast side of the road leading to Wormley's Creek and the

balance being 139 acres on north-west side of said road and bounded as follows:

Beginning at a pine in a branch (thence up said branch which divides this from said Griffin's Wormley's tract of land), south - - - to the center of the Wormley's or Back Creek road, thence south 49 degrees, west 82 poles along said road to a turn in road thence South and West - - - thence by a line of marked tree now made, south - - - east to a pine, thence S --E - - - S - - - E - - to a white gum corner of Griffin and Fisher and John Hogg's 50 acres hereinbefore mentioned, thence to said 50 acres, North - - - West - - - to the center of Wormley's or Back Creek road, thence along said road, S - - W - - to corner of Burt in road, thence by Burt's line N - - W - - to a pine in Fork of branch, thence N - - W - - to a pine corner of Stedman's Mill acre, thence N - -E - -N - -W to a pine at the edge of creek thence 4 poles to the center of Wormley's creek, thence down said creek as it meanders to lower point, thence up a branch of said creek as it meanders to the beginning pine.

The said tracts or parcels of land being a part of the tract of land called Wormleys Creek whereof the late Dr. Corbin Griffin died siezed and possessed and which on his death descended to his son and only heir the said Thomas Griffin - saving and excepting the water grist mill attached to the tract of land last mentioned for the use of the said Thomas Griffin's Wormley's Creek plantation so long as the same shall be kept up, and all houses etc. to the said tracts or

parcels of land belonging or in any wise appertaining etc - -
 all title, right etc. of them the said Thomas Griffin and
 Mary his wife - - - - To have and to hold the said tracts
 or parcels of land with the appurtenances (except as before
 excepted) unto the said John Hogg Sen. his heirs and assigns
 to the only proper use and behoof of him the said John Hogg
 Senior his heirs and assigns forever - - - - and will defend.
 In witness whereof signed Thomas Griffin

Mary Griffin

To prevent any misunderstanding relative to the Mill
 mentioned in the foregoing deed and that the parties may
 fully understand each other the said John Hogg Senior agrees
 hereby and it is distinctly understood that so long as the
 said Mill shall be kept up and in use he will not in any
 manner interrupt, impede or restrain the free passage of
 water into the pond of the said mill, that he will allow to
 the said Thomas Griffin free passage to and from the said
mill to the road leading to Back Creek and Goodwin's Islands
 - And the said Thomas Griffin on his part covenants and agrees
 and it is hereby fully understood that whenever the said Mill
 shall be suffered to go down and rendered unfit for use
 whereby the said Thomas Griffin shall lose the benefit of
 rebuilding within the period limited and provided by law,
 that all the benefit and advantage which can result to or be
 derived by him, the said John Hogg Sr. as owner of the land
 thereunto appurtenant is and hereby shall be vested in him
 the said Hogg and his Heirs. (signed) John Hogg; Thos. Griffin

January 24, 1814 Rec'd in part payment of Mr. J. Hogg \$660.00
At Court Apr. 18, 1814 it was recorded.

Note that the indenture (or deed) was dated March 21, 1814; that part payment of \$660.00 was made January 24; at court held April 14, it was recorded. Also on April 14 two justices were appointed to wait on Mary Griffin and report to the court:

"Whereas Thomas Griffin and Mary Griffin his wife, by their certain indenture of bargain and sale, bearing date of 21st of March, 1814, have sold and conveyed unto John Hogg Senior, the fee simple estate of and in a certain tract, piece, or parcel of land, situate, lying and being in the parish of Charles, and County of York, containing by a late survey 172 acres."

Mary Griffin could not conveniently travel to court and two justices were appointed 18th of April, 1814 to go to her and examine her etc., and return to court. (7)

This order was carried out and the justices returned the proper affadavit June 4, 1814.

It seems that John Hogg Sr. also owned a track of land called Tenham's Neck; he gave a deed of trust against this place for \$900.00. The record does not state the number of acres in Tenham's Neck, but it does tell that John Hogg Sr. bought this land from Thomas and Mary Griffin, as well as the Wormley's Creek plantation. The mortgage record follows: (8)

"January 14, 1815, This indenture, between John Hogg, Senior of the one part and Thomas Griffin of York of the other part, witnesseth, for and in consideration of \$900.00 - - - to the said John Hogg Sr. in hand paid - - - bargained and sold - - tract of land called "Thenhams Neck" and which the said John Hogg, Sr. has recently bought of said Thomas Griffin, with all and singular appurtenances, to have and to hold said land from the day next before the day of the date thereof; provided always and upon condition that the said John Hogg Sr., his heirs etc. shall and do, well and truly, pay unto said Thomas Griffin, his heirs etc., the just and full sum of \$785.00 upon the first day of March next - - -.

Sixteenth of January, 1815 by 35 dollars, in part of the within deed of trust (signed) John Hogg Senr." Witnesses were Peyton Smith, Nath. Young, N. Taylor and James X Hogg. At a court held 16 January 1815, this indenture of mortgage was acknowledged by John Hogg Sr. and recorded (teste) Sam Sheild, cyc."

Within the next six years this mortgage was paid and the Release was recorded December 1821. (9)

The dwelling house on the Wormley's Creek plantation was situated toward the northern part of the long peninsula of land, with a branch of the creek running southerly on either side. The house, a two story frame dwelling faced north on the creek, and south toward a sandy lane which ran

for a mile to the main road and a signpost which pointed north to Yorktown, and south, south-east toward Crab Neck. John Hogg's will mentions a tooth-ache tree which grew on the west side of the lane about a quarter of a mile from the dwelling house. The toothache trees have continued to send up new shoots, as the trunk and limbs of the old tree have died, so there has been the patch of this kind of tree or shrub with its aromatic, sharp-tasting leaves growing continuously on this Hogg plantation-home, for more than 125 years.

The family burying ground for John Hogg², Sr. and his family, having been established early in the 19th Century, was located on the west side of the lane on a high knoll of ground and not very far from the banks of the western branch of Wormley's Creek. At the beginning of the 20th Century the cemetery spread out, around the base of a huge mulberry tree for a radius of about 50 yards. There were other trees within the enclosure -- pines, a couple of cedars, a sweet-gum tree some myrtle bushes, a few dogwood trees, and an immense wild grape vine climbed the old mulberry tree and tossed its branches to the other neighboring trees, encircling and entwining them with its many runners.

Within the Orders books in the York County Clerks office may be found records of John Hogg Sr. as he performed his civic duties, such as settling the estate of a neighbor; serving jury duty; surveyor of roads, etc. On February 8,

1814 John Hogg, Caleb Fisher, John A. Rogers and John Fox appraised the estate of Robert Tabb and reported to the Court.⁽¹⁰⁾ At a Court held at Yorktown March 20, 1815, John Hogg Senior was appointed a juror.⁽¹¹⁾ Another Order stated: "September 18, 1815 It is ordered that the road leading from Stroud's Shop to Peter Goodwins Jr.; of which Bernard Elliott was surveyor, he added to the list of public roads, and designated by Precinct No. 20 and that John Hogg Senior be appointed surveyor of said road in the room of said Elliott."⁽¹²⁾

John Hogg² Sr. and his "Loving Wife" had seven children:

- A. William Hogg³ (called senior) born ca 1785;
- B. Zachariah Hogg³, born ca 1791;
- C. John Hogg³ the Younger, born ca, 1794;
- D. James Hogg³, born ca. 1798;
- E. Mary D.Hogg³, born 1801;
- F. Thomas Hogg³ Sr. born 1804;
- G. Lewis Hogg³ Jr. born 1810.

John Hogg² Sr. made his will in 1841. It follows:

"In the name of God, amen, I, John Hogg Senior, of the County of York, being in my right mind, do make and ordain this instrument of writing, my last will and testament.

First, it is my wish that my executors hereafter to be named shall pay all my just debts.

Item 1st; I lend to my beloved wife as long as she lives that part of my plantation upon which I reside, lying east

of the lane, commencing at the branch near the crib, and running through the passage of my dwelling house, down the lane to the toothache tree and thence to the creek, and also I lend her during her life the entire use of the chamber, the room I now occupy. It is my wish that after the death of my said wife, my son Lewis Hogg shall have the above mentioned land and room, to him and his heirs forever. I also lend my said wife three pine chests, one desk, one bofet (sic), the bed, bedstead and furniture in the chamber, two of the best cows I have, two yokes of steers. I give my said wife my spoons and china cups and saucers.

Item second: I give to my son Thomas Hogg, the tract of land upon which he now resides, after cutting off thirty-three acres from the upper end of said tract, next to Mr. Morelands, the line to commence at the main road and to be run straight to the meadow.

Item third: I give to my son James Hogg, thirty-five acres of land commencing at R. L. Farinholts fence and running up between the old Mill dam and main road.

Item fourth: I lend to my daughter Mary Bassett during her life the thirty-three acres of land directed to be cut off from the tract of land given to my son Thomas Hogg, and at her death give it to her children to them and their heirs forever.

Item fifth: I give to my son Lewis Hogg that part of my land, commencing at the Tooth-ache tree, running down the lane a south course and thence a straight line to the old Mill dam.

Item sixth: I give to my grandchildren, the children of my son John Hogg, dec'd, Eliza, Thomas, Elizabeth and John Hogg all that part of my tract of land upon which I reside, lying west of the lane, commencing at the branch near the crib, and running around to the west of the dwelling house, fifty yards rear of said house thence down the lane to the upper lines. It is my positive direction that the land given to my grandchildren, shall not under any circumstances be sold until the youngest child becomes of age, that is to say, the Bassett children shall not sell until they are all of age, that my son John Hogg's children shall not sell the land given them until they are all of age.

Item seventh: I give to my son Zachariah Hogg, the tract of land upon which he now resides, to him and his heirs forever.

It is my wish and I do positively direct that the land given to my above named children and grandchildren, shall all be valued by three disinterested persons, as my object is to make an equal distribution of my property to the best advantage for them, and that each party shall pay or receive by valuation as the case may be, thereby making each share equal. I wish the land given my son Zachariah, valued, that given Thomas, James, Lewis, Mary Bassett and John Hogg's children, and for each one to pay or receive according to valuations. It is alone upon such conditions that I make the

aforesaid gifts of land to my said children.

Item eighth: It is my wish that all the residue of my property not named be equally divided between my children and that the children of my son John Hogg, dec'd. be entitled and receive one equal share. It is my wish and I do hereby appoint my two sons, Zachariah and Lewis Hogg my Executors to this my last will and testament. Signed by me this 23rd day of February, 1841, in the presence of

February 24, 1841 - as it is not my intention to give my dwelling house to my son John Hogg's children and fearing it might be so construed, I make the following disposal of said house;

First, I do not wish my house valued as my object is to give it to my children hereafter to be named, exclusively of the land and other property given them. I give to my son Lewis Hogg the room he now occupies and the north closet with a free access through the passage. I lend to my daughter Mary Bassett, the use of the large room on the lower floor as long as she lives, with the right to pass out through the passage.

I lend my sister Mary Marshall, the room she now occupies upstairs as long as she is disposed to remain in it. I do further lend my beloved wife the south closet upstairs and the closet downstairs, with the free use of the passage upstairs and down.

I give my son Lewis Hogg, at the death of my wife and my daughter Mary Bassett, the whole of my dwelling house, to him and his heirs forever. The lot of land left around the house, say fifty yards around, I lend to my beloved wife for her use as long as she lives, and at her death, I give it to my son John Hogg's children, to them and their heirs forever. I give to my wife all my household and kitchen furniture together with all my fowls, two sows with their pigs on them and four killing hogs. I lend to my said wife my jack plane, smoothing plane, drawing knife, gouges fro and hand mill. I direct that all my property not named be sold and distributed as directed above. I direct that this codicil be taken as a part of my will made on yesterday the 23rd February, 1841. Signed the date above written. (signed) John X Hogg, Senior.

At a court held for York County the 10th day of January, 1843, this will was proved by the oaths of R. B. Moreland and Lewis Moreland, two of the witnesses thereto, and the codicil, thereunder written was proved by the oaths of Richard R. Garrett and the said Robert B. Moreland, two of the witnesses to the same; the said will and codicil were also sworn to by Zachariah Hogg, one of the Executors therein named and ordered to be recorded. And certificate for obtaining a probate thereof in due form was granted the said Executor he having, together

with William Hogg his security, entered into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of eight hundred dollars conditioned as the law directs. Liberty is reserved to Lewis Hogg the other Executor in the said will named to join in the probate thereof when he shall think fit.

R. R. Garrett, John C. Moreland, Robert B. Moreland and John T. Moreland were appointed January 16, 1843 by order of York Court, as commissioners to appraise the estate of John Hogg Senior, deceased. They took oath on January 18, that "they would impartially appraise the property" before William Tabb, Justice of Peace (15).

Following is the Inventory and Appraisement of the estate of John Hogg Senr., deceased, taken this 18th day of January, 1843. (16)

January 1, 1846, In obedience to an order of the worshipful Court of York County dated the 16th day of December 1844 the undersigned, as the commissioner of said court has examined, stated and settled at the request of William Hogg, son of Zachariah Hogg, deceased, the said Zachariah's account of administration as the Executor of John Hogg Senr., deceased, as above and finds a balance on said Zachariah Hogg's estate from the estate of his testator of \$21.89 on the first of January, 1846 with interest thereon from that time till paid. The charges numbered from one to seven were paid by William Hogg since his Intestator's death and will be proper debits against Zachariah Hogg's estate in his settlement thereof.

The foregoing records give the vital statistics of John Hogg² Senior: that he was the youngest son of Richard Hogg¹ Sr. and Mary Austin Hogg, born October 23, 1757; that he was only four months old when his mother died. His birth was recorded in the Abingdon Parish Register, Gloucester County, Va., showing that he was a native of Gloucester. Tax records, first in Gloucester and then in York County

show that he moved from Gloucester to York. His home in York County and various civic activities were identified by the county court records. His will, written in 1841 names six of his seven children. Other records name the seventh child. He was a member of Grafton Christian Church (called at that time, "Campbellite") near Cockletown and his death on January 1, 1843 was recorded in the records of this church. Court records have given a detailed account of the settlement of his estate, which was begun by Zachariah Hogg, named his executor in his will, and completed by William Hogg Jr. son of Zachariah, who died before these legal transactions were finished. He was survived by his wife, whose death-date is not available, and was buried in the Hogg family cemetery on his Wormley's Creek plantation.
