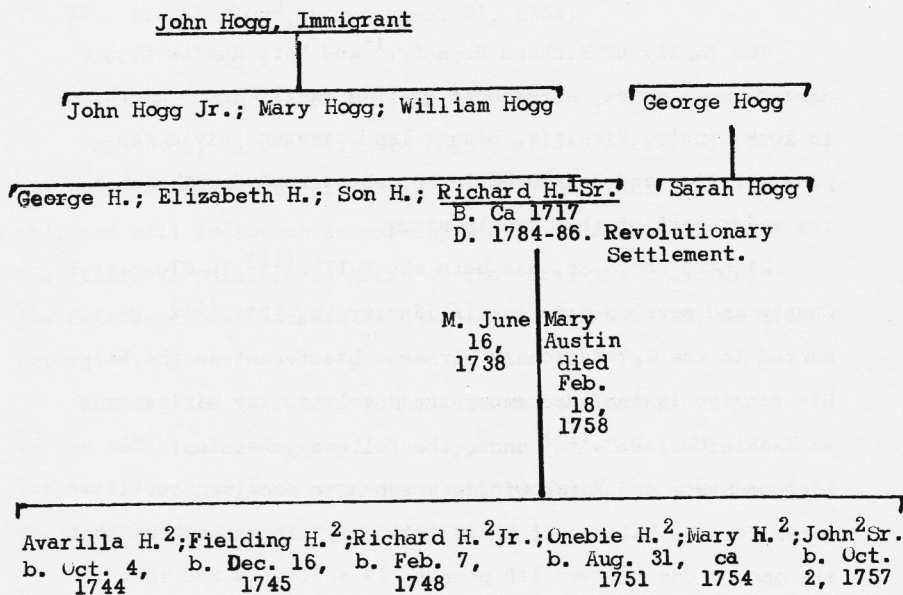

Chapter 1

Prelude to Parts I, and II

Richard Hogg Sr.

The family of Richard Hogg Sr.¹ and Mary Austin Hogg demands more space, as members of this family group migrated to York County, Virginia, bought land, assumed civic responsibilities and reared children, whose records make up the major part of this family study.

Richard Hogg¹ Sr. was born about 1717⁽¹¹⁾ in Gloucester County and married Mary Austin January 16, 1738.⁽¹²⁾ He served in the Revolutionary War as a Lieutenant in the Navy. His service is included among the Revolutionary War records in Washington, D.C.⁽¹³⁾ under the following heading: "A list of State and Naval Officers who have received certificates for the balance of their full pay," it was stated that the amount due him was 146 pounds, 12 shillings and that it was paid March 10, 1786 to Reub. Coates, Hogg's administrator. This proved Richard Hogg's death date as being prior to 1786, probably 1784, in Gloucester County, Virginia.

Lacking definite proof that John Hogg, the immigrant was the father of George Hogg Senior, or that George Hogg was the father of Richard Hogg Sr., the genealogical designations, in this family study will begin with Richard Hogg¹ Sr, numbered as generation "one". Names and birthdates of his children, as follows, are repeated here for clarity:

- I. Avarilla Hogg², born October 4, 1744;
- II. Fielding Hogg², born December 16, 1745;
- III. Richard Hogg Jr.², born February 7, 1748;
- IV. Onebie Hogg², born August 31, 1751;
- V. Mary Hogg², born ca. 1754;
- VI. John Hogg², born October 23, 1757

Mary Hogg, wife of Richard Hogg¹ Sr. and mother of these six children died February 18, 1758.⁽¹²⁾ The tracing of their children will follow on succeeding pages, in Part I and Part II. While very little is known of the first two children, the data regarding Richard Hogg² Jr.; the third child, is quite extensive. These will be grouped in Part I.

Very little is known of the next two children, but data on the sixth and youngest, John Hogg² Sr. were available. These three children will be presented, with emphasis on John Hogg² Sr. and his descendants, in Part II.

Chapter 2

Avarilla Hogg² and Fielding Hogg².

I. Avarilla Hogg², daughter and first child of Richard Hogg¹ Sr. and his wife Mary Austin Hogg, was born October 4, 1744. Nothing further is known of her. The loss of Gloucester County records makes it impossible to trace her line, or to determine whether or not she reached adulthood, married and had descendants.

II. Fielding Hogg², second child of Richard Hogg¹ Sr. and Mary Austin Hogg, was born December 16, 1745. The Gloucester County Sheriff's tax list for Abingdon Parish listed Fielding Hogg² from 1770 through 1782. The following interesting article was taken from the Virginia Gazette of May 6, 1773:

"April 1, 1773, we, the subscribers, finding the wreck of a vessell upon York Spit which was broken to pieces, being but the stem, stern and floor which we supposed to be the boat belonging to Mr. Stephen Goff, in which the white servants were drowned, and by sounding the bottom with our boat-hook, we found the foresail, fore halliard and blocks, jib, anchor, cable, rudder and two short pieces of cable.

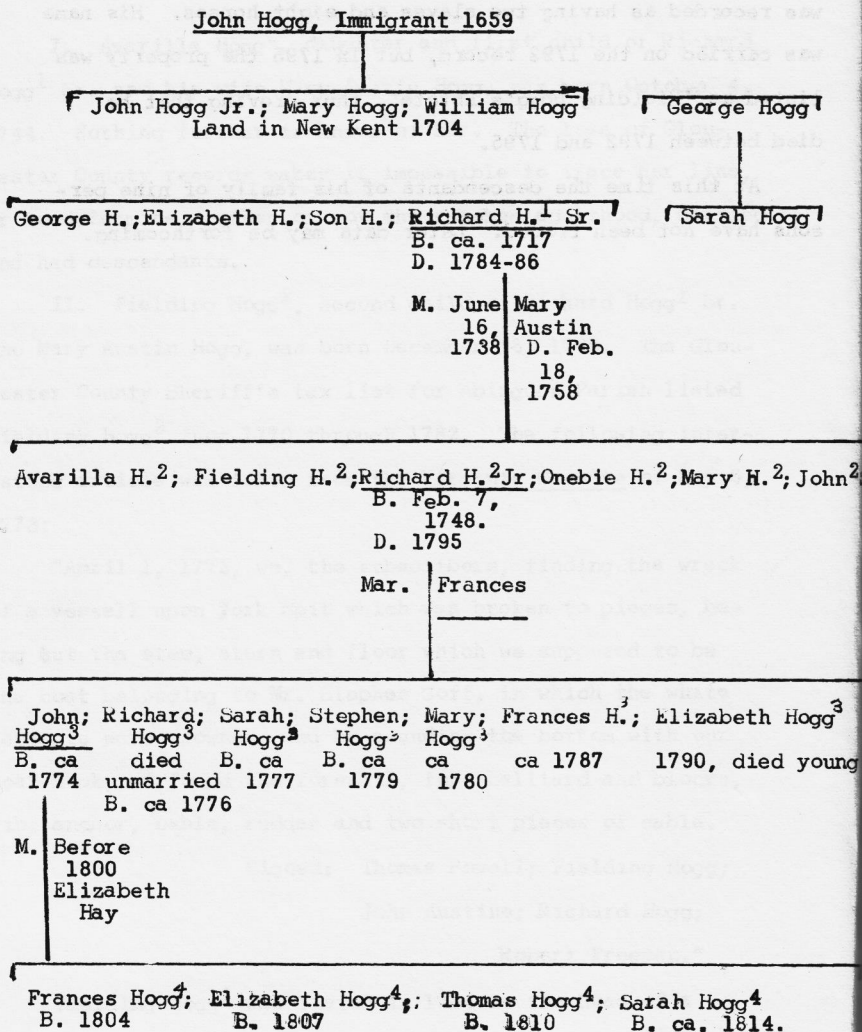
Fielding Hogg² was listed in 1784 as the head of a household of nine white persons in Abingdon Parish. (14)

Gloucester County property tax records showed in 1782 Fielding Hogg² had one slave and seven horses; in 1788 he was recorded as having two slaves and eight horses. His name was carried on the 1792 record, but in 1795 the property was listed as 'Fielding Hogg's Estate', thus proving that he died between 1792 and 1795.

At this time the descendants of his family of nine persons have not been traced. Later data may be forthcoming.

Chapter 3

Richard Hogg² Jr. and Descendants

III. Richard Hogg² Jr., third child of Richard Hogg¹ Sr. and his wife Mary Austin Hogg, was born February 7, 1748 in Gloucester County, Virginia. He married Frances _____. His name appears in the Gloucester County tax list for 1784. In 1789 Richard Hogg² appears on the personal tax books for York County. This indicates that he moved from Gloucester to York County between 1784 and 1789.

Richard Hogg Jr. attended York County Court four days as a witness for James Lunsford against John A. Rogers and the "Court ordered Lunsford to pay him 100 pounds of tobacco for attending this court four days." Court was held August 18, 1791 and was continued. (15)

He was a witness to a deed September 29, 1792 between Goosley and Elliott. (16)

In 1794 Richard Hogg Jr. made his will and the next year, he died. Following is the will:

In the name of God, amen, I, Richard Hogg of York County, being afflicted in body but of sound mind and memory, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following, viz:

I give unto my son John Hogg, my young gray horse about four years old and in case my said son should die before he

arrives to the age of twenty-one, the said horse to be sold and equally divided amongst my surviving children and their heirs.

I give unto my son, Richard Hogg my young bay horse about four years old, and in case Richard should die before he attains to the age of twenty-one years 'tis my desire that the said horse should go to my son Stephen Hogg.

I give unto my son Stephen Hogg when he shall attain to the age of sixteen years the sum of six pounds specie, in order to purchase a horse, but should Stephen die before he attains to the age of twenty-one years, 'tis my desire that what I have given him may return and be equally divided between my children and their surviving heirs.

I give unto my two daughters Mary and Sally, two cows and calves to each (each having a cow and calf now in their possession) to them and their heirs forever.

I give unto my two youngest children Frances and Elizabeth, provided they attain to the age of eighteen, the sum of seven pounds each, to them and their heirs forever.

All the residue of my estate I leave in the hands of my wife so long as she remains my widow for the support of herself and my younger children, and at her death I desire that what of my estate may be remaining shall be equally divided amongst my children or their surviving heirs. But with the proviso that should my wife die before my two younger children arrives to twelve years of age, then each party sharing in my estate shall equally contribute to the support of the said two younger children until they respectively arrive to twelve years of age,

and should my wife marry, I desire that my estate may be immediately sold off and disposed of as I have devised in case of her death.

Lastly, I appoint my respected friends Richard Garrett and Bernard Elliott executors of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all others, as witness my hand and seal this 16th day of October 1794.

This will was proved in York Court April 20, 1795 by the oaths of Williby Jordan and John Stroud, two of the witnesses thereto, sworn to by Richard Garrett and Bernard Elliott the executors therein named and ordered to be recorded. The executors gave bond of 200 pounds. (18)

At the same court, appraisers were appointed to examine and value the estate of the late Richard Hogg. Their report follows:

Returned unto York Court 20th day of July, 1795 and ordered to be recorded - (signed) Ro. H. Wallor clc. (19)

The settlement of the estate was completed within the next seven years. The court record states:

"Settlement of Richard Hogg's Estate

Dr. The Estate of Richard Hogg, deceased in account with Bernard Elliott and Richard Garrett Cr.

Paid in 1799 To making coffin for Mr. Hogg 1 f - 4s.

To one bottle rum (used at the sale) $\frac{2}{1 - 6 - 0}$

By Amount of Account of Sales of the Estate, f 199 - 16 - 4

less the 1 f - 6 s, left f 198 - 10 - 4.

In obedience to an order of the worshipful Court of York County, bearing date the 21st day of December, 1801, we the subscribers having met and examined the accounts of Bernard Elliott and Richard Garrett, Executors of Richard Hogg, dec'd and find a balance due the estate of 198 f - 10 - 4. (signed) Robert

Tompkins, Martin Goodwin, Peter Goodwin Junr. Returned into York County Court the 21st June, 1802 and ordered to be recorded - teste. Rt. H. Wallor cl.c. (20)

The children of Richard² and Frances Hogg, were named in his will. Their birthdates have been estimated by certain sentences in the will. Names of the seven children:

- A. John Hogg³, under 21 in 1794; born ca 1774;
- B. Richard Hogg³, the second son, born ca 1776;
- C. Sarah Hogg³, called Sally, born ca 1777;
- D. Stephen Hogg³, under 16 in 1794; born ca 1779;
- E. Mary Hogg³, born ca 1780;
- F. Frances Hogg³, under 12 in 1794; born ca 1787;
- G. Elizabeth Hogg³, also under 12 in 1794; born in 1790.

The will of Williby Jordan, later, helps in the approximation of these birthdates.

The year after her husband's death Frances Hogg leased the land on which she was living to Edward Harwood. When she made her will in 1800, she willed the land to her eldest son, John Hogg³. Following is the lease agreement:

"Edward Harwood hath leased during his natural life that tract or parcel of land where the said Frances Hogg now lives, beginning at Phillips line on Back Creek thence along the said line so as to include as much of the wood land as will be necessary for the Plantation use on the east side beginning on the above mentioned creek thence along the line between the tenement of Leven Jordan and the said Frances Hogg, to her the

said Frances Hogg her heirs or assigns during the above mentioned term, for the consideration of 35 pounds paid in manner following, that is to say, one half to be paid in cash on the day of acknowledgement, the other half to be paid in stock or other produce as the parties may agree, on or before the first day of January next, the said Frances Hogg to pay one third part of the taxes annually on the whole plantation, and for the well and true performance of all and singular the above Covenants and Agreements, we the said Edward Harwood and Frances Hogg do bend ourselves, our heirs and assigns each to the other, whereof have hereunto affixed their hands and seals the day and year of July 14, 1796. Witnesses: Harwood Burt; Thomas Dawson and John T. Burt. (signed) E. Harwood; Frances X Hogg.

At a Court 18th day July, 1796 - - - - recorded. (21)

Frances Hogg lived only five years after her husband's death and during that time, four of her children died. Sarah died before the first of January 1796, leaving three small sons; Richard died, unmarried; Elizabeth, about nine years of age, and Mary who was survived by a daughter, all died before 1800. Proof of these deaths was found in the will of a son-in-law and in Frances Hogg's will, which follows:

"In the name of God, Amen, I, Frances Hogg of the County of York, being weak in body but of perfect sound sense and memory, blessed be God, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and form as followeth, that is to say

my will and desire is that my just debts and funeral expenses be first paid next after my decease.

I give and bequeathe to my son, John Hogg the land whereon I now live. I give one half of my crop of corn now in the field to my son, Stephen Hogg, the other half to be equally divided between Frances Hogg and my grand-daughter Ann Jourden.

My will and desire is that the hundred and fifty dollars in my desk be equally divided among my children and grandchildren, namely: My son John Hogg, thirty dollars, my son Stephen Hogg to have thirty dollars, my daughter Frances Hogg to have thirty dollars, and my grand-daughter Ann Jourden to have thirty dollars; and thirty dollars to be divided between my three grandsons, Thomas Stroud, Richard Stroud and William Stroud and my desire is that if either of my grandsons die before they come to lawful age my will and desire is that the surviving ones shall have the whole.

And I do appoint my son John Hogg my sole Executor of this my last will and testament. Given under my hand and seal the 26th day _____ in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred (1800).

(signed) Frances X Hogg

Signed, sealed and delivered

in the presence of Lewice X Hogg (sic), Martin Goodwin and Rebekah X Hay. (22)

This will was probated October 20, 1800.

Rebecca Hay who witnessed Frances Hogg's will, above, was the sister of Elizabeth Hay who married John Hogg³, the eldest son of Richard² and Frances Hogg. Rebecca married Stephen Hogg³, another son of Richard Jr.² and Frances Hogg. This will be brought out in a later chapter.

A study of the descendants of Richard Hogg² Jr. and his wife Frances will be of interest as it unfolds in the pages to follow. John Hogg³ the oldest son was called Junior to distinguish him from his uncle who was older, and known as John Hogg, Senior.
