State of Virginia
County of Gloucester

On this 6 day of August 1832 personally appeared in
Open Court before the Justices of the Court of Gloucester
now sitting, Thomas Hogg a resident of
Gloucester County and state of Virginia aged Sixty
Eight — years, who being first duly sworn according
to law, doth on his oath make the following declara-
tion, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of
Congress passed June 7th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States
under the Command of Captain Gideon Blenheim
of the Virginia militia in the County of Gloucester and state
of Virginia before he was sixteen years old, and served
under him from time to time until after the surrender
of Cornwallis at York town.

He served at one time continuously for several months
when the British Man of War, the Bonetta came
up York River in 1781.

At the time of the Siege at York the Company
to which he was attached, was stationed on the
eastern side of Sarah's Creek, at Ferrin's a short
distance from Gloucester town watching the move-
ments of the British forces at that place.

That he served in all at least two years, but was
never in a regular action, though he was in a
Smart skirmish with the light horse a little above
Gloucester town near Swellens.

His services were chiefly in Gloucester, but was twice
sent to York and Wmbsurg.

Belonging to the State militia he was at all
times liable to be called out and was accor-

dingly from time to time. That no discharge was
ever granted and of course he has none to produce
but in evidence of his services he refers to the annex-
ed Certificates of Witnesses.

He hereby relinquishes every Claim to a pension or
annuity except the present and declares that his
name is not on the pension roll of the agency
of any State. Sworn to and subscribed this

residing in the County of Gloucester and State of
Virginia Certify that we ~~are~~ are well acquainted
with Thomas Hogg who has subscribed

him to be sixty eight years of age; that he is
reputed and believed, in the neighbourhood where
he resides to have been a Soldier of the Revolution
and that we concur in that opinion.

are residents of the County of Gloucester & State of Virginia, and that they are credible persons, and that their statement is entitled to credit—

In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal of office this 15th day of August 1832 in the 57th year of the Commonwealth

On this 8th day of February — 1833 personally appeared before John Scott, J. P. a Justice of the Peace for the County of Gloucester and State of Virginia Thomas Hogg who has sworn to the foregoing declaration and doth in his oath make this additional statement in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress June 7th 1832.

That his first Services were under Capt^m Gipsan Chivers in Gloucester County near the mouth of York River, at which place he served three Months. His next Services were at Gloucester

3 Town, at which place he served under Capt^l Samuel Addings of the artillery, Capt^l Cluverus, and Capt^l John Thurston for nine months.

4 That he served in Williams Burg for eight months.

He was then brought to York Town, and served at that place and, at Sewell's ordinary in Gloucester County for two months.

That the next place at which he served was Perrin's a short distance below Gloucester Town at which place he

served for at least three months,

and was in regular service at that place in the Militia, when Lord Cornwallis

surrendered in York Town, on the 19th of October 1781.

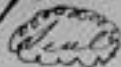

On this 20 day of April 1833 personally appeared
before W^m C. POTTIN - Justice of the Peace for the
County of Gloucester and State of Virginia, Thomas
Hagg who has sworn to the above declaration, and
made Oath, that he did not intend to be un-
derstood as saying, that he served in the Militia
a tour at Gloucester Town of Nine months,
and another in Williamsburg of Eight months;
but that his meaning was this; That he served
three Tours at Gloucester Town under said officers
which amounted to Nine months in the whole.
And that though he did not serve a tour of
Eight months in Williamsburg, he did serve that
Time in Succession, for after his tour of three
months was out, he entered on a first tour &
continued to the best of his recollection, in suc-
cessive service, one tour after another, for the
time that he has stated.

If it be true that I have more coming to me than fifty dollars a year, will you be so good as to collect or receive the increase which I ought to have received heretofore and which I may be entitled to receive now; or any other money which may be due me as pension or for services in the Revolutionary War and forward it to Joel Hayes Sr. my agent here, who will receive the same and pay it to me.

Please attend to my claim promptly and procure the increase which you will forward as directed and by so doing you will greatly oblige your
